Letter From Our Executive Director Nesha Mason



In the past year, we've heard the following situation played out in various ways but today, I'm going to share Julie's story. Julie came to The Drake House while experiencing homelessness, with her children in her arms, and tears in her eyes, explaining that despite everything she had tried, she just couldn't hang onto her apartment. She and her family were now living in her car. She explained that even though it had been a struggle, she had been doing okay, until it was time to renew her lease. Julie discovered that her rent would increase from the \$1983 she was scraping to afford to \$2700, which was simply too much. That increased expense coupled with the ever-increasing cost of groceries, meant that Julie had to make a choice – food, transportation and the appearance of normalcy in exchange for her apartment. Even though she had a good job, and worked overtime when she could, it just wasn't enough.

Thankfully for Julie and all the other moms in similar circumstances, our North Fulton community is full of compassion, commitment, and partnership. It is because of our community that The Drake House continues to be a refuge for the families who need it. It is because of **your** compassion that we are able to house families in private, fully furnished apartments for an even longer average length of stay than ever before. It is because of **your** commitment to our mission that we were able to take on an emergency, one that proved to be a total renovation of our crisis housing, without missing a beat. And it is because of the partnerships we've forged with our Neighbor-to-Neighbor apartment sponsors and other non-profits, like HomeAid and Sunshine on a Ranney Day, that we are able to update our campus to meet the changing needs of the residents who live here.

The good news is that Julie is now a graduate of our program and on her way to being stably housed. And like her, other graduates of our program will continue to thrive in their work, pay their taxes, rent apartments, purchase groceries, attend faith-based organizations, and hopefully, one day, become homeowners. They will be equipped to be good employees, tenants, and neighbors. As we continue our work to improve our program and our campus, we do so with the expectation that the results will lead to more graduates, more resilient children and teens, and ultimately, a stronger community.



THE DRAKE HOUSE

The Drake House is our 15-unit crisis housing program. The program offers a variety of services to assist single mothers and their children who are experiencing homelessness as they begin their journey toward self-sufficiency. Our Programming services include:

Providing one-on-one career coaching that includes developing a resume and identifying a career path towards financial security.

Working together to identify goals and needs of the family and the resources to promote success.

Providing weekly educational programs on topics including relationship building, parenting strategies, health and wellness, and money management.



THE DRAKE HOUSE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

BASIC NECCESSITIES

Short-term, furnished housing; groceries, personal care essentials; laundry facilities; and MARTA passes.

CHILDREN & TEEN PROGRAMS

Elementary and middle school students attend an after-school program for tutoring, enrichment activities, and social-emotional learning skills. Teens meet bi-weekly for life-skills workshops and enrichment programming.

EDUCATION

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Mothers attend mandatory, weekly life skills classes focused on improving personal finances, health and well-being, relationship management, parenting skills and nutritional meal planning.

CAREER SERVICES

Mothers meet weekly with our Career Coach to assist with resume development, interviewing skills, career attire, career development, and job leads. Career seminars led by industry-related professionals are offered throughout the year. In addition, each apartment is equipped with a desktop computer and internet access for job searching and remote work.

EMPOWERMENT PLAN

Using EmPATH's Bridge to Self-Sufficiency as a tool, mothers meet at intake with our Family Service Manager who helps the family identify and design a customized list of personal and professional goals to attain while at The Drake House. Plans include setting financial goals for self-sufficiency and stable housing, as well as identifying any medical, vision, dental and mental health needs of the family. We partner with many community-based organizations and pro-bono resources to fill the gap of needed services.

ADVOCATE

Each family member is paired with a trained volunteer N2N advocate who provides support, encouragement, and friendship.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

Upon intake, mothers and children are offered a mental health assessment to address concerns such as Depression, Anxiety and more. Mental Health care is provided if the family chooses.

BRIDGE TO SELF-SUFFICIENCY



This client-centered, trauma-informed approach defines five key areas of self-sufficiency. Upon intake, our residents are scored in each area, and program needs are determined based on the areas they need help addressing. A 90-day evaluation is used to determine progress across areas.

THE DRAKE HOUSE crisis housing program

The Drake House is our crisis housing program where families are assessed and provided with an empowerment plan to address their goals. This is the first step in our continuum of care leading families on the path to self-sufficiency.

HOMEAID RENOVATION





On May 3, The Drake House launched our fifth project with

homeaid

a local nonprofit that connects the building community with housing organizations to provide homes for people experiencing homelessness.

The scope of work included:

- Replacing all the cast iron pipes
- Updating bathroom and kitchen fixtures and cabinets
- Replacing carpet with laminate flooring
- Hardwired internet

The work began in the B Building. All 8 units were emptied and addressed at the same time to expedite the process, which took approximately 12 weeks. As soon as the work was completed there, we joined forces with our **Neighbor to Neighbor Partners** and moved the residents from Building A into the newly refurbished units in Building B so that work could then begin on the second set of units to complete the project.

The timing of this project happened to coincide with many additional levels of housing assistance brought about by local and state government in response to the pandemic. As a result, The Drake House was experiencing the lowest number of housing inquiries since it's inception, making it the best time for us to proceed with a project of this magnitude that we could have ever foreseen.

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THE DRAKE VILLAGE

The Drake Village is our 16-unit affordable housing program that serves as a continuum of The Drake House. The program is designed to replicate independent living. Residents sign a lease to help rebuild rental history. Families are able to stay for up to two years which provides additional stability for the children. TDV residents continue to have access to the after-school program, one-on-one career services, mental health support, and monthly meetings with case and budget coaches. The TDV program provides sustainable housing stability by:

Rebuilding Positive Rental History complete with a landlord letter of recommendation upon move-out



Paying down debt to increase credit score



Monthly financial planning including budgeting and increasing savings



THE DRAKE VILLAGE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

BASIC NECCESSITIES

One to two-year lease-housing at 60% of Fair Market Rate; personal furnishings, lease, and utilities in their name to improve rental history.

CHILDREN & TEEN PROGRAMS

Elementary and middle school students attend an after-school program for tutoring, enrichment activities, and social-emotional learning skills. Teens meet bi-weekly for life-skills workshops and enrichment programming.

DELIVERABLES

Mothers meet monthly with Family Service Manager to assess progress in the areas of Increased Income, Increased Savings, Increased Credit Score, and Decreased Debt.

CAREER SERVICES

Mothers meet weekly with our Career Coach to provide assistance, career development, and job leads. Career seminars led by industry-related professionals are offered throughout the year.

BUDGET COACHES

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Volunteers assist Drake Village residents with systems to track all income and expenses to develop a plan that prioritizes necessary spending and savings over discretionary spending. Residents learn about spending patterns, money attitudes, and financial goals while working together to develop a plan for future spending.

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM

The After School Program provides regular care onsite weekdays from 3:00-6:30 PM In addition, ASP provides full-day care on non-holiday school closures; including all School Breaks and Summer Break.

Partners provide "ownership" of an apartment by painting and furnishing, and providing that homey touch. All apartments at The Drake House and The Drake Village are sponsored by individuals, faith-based, corporate or service organizations known as Neighbor to Neighbor Partners.

Partners serve as advocates who provide support and encouragement to our moms and children. They also provide a connection to the community through knowledge of events, parks, and activities happening in the community. Partners assist The Drake House graduate in securing furnishings and moving items into The Drake Village apartment. They also identify two volunteers to attend training and serve as Budget Coaches for the family.
