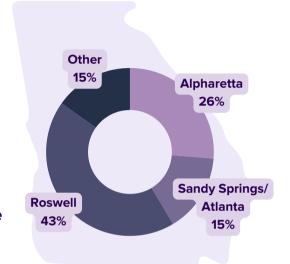

BRIDGE TO SELF-SUFFICIENCY



This client-centered, trauma-informed approach defines five key areas of self-sufficiency. Upon intake, our residents are scored in each area, and program needs are determined based on the areas they need help addressing. A 90-day evaluation is used to determine progress across areas.

OUR TWO-GENERATIONAL APPROACH

The Drake House recognizes the need to provide two-generational support to help families overcome the circumstance of homelessness. As such, we increased our programming to focus on the diverse and specific needs of the youth and teens on our campus. Thanks to a partnership with another non-profit, Sunshine on a Ranney Day, our newly renovated spaces provide a more therapeutic space to help the children we serve overcome the trauma of homelessness aligning with our two-generational model.

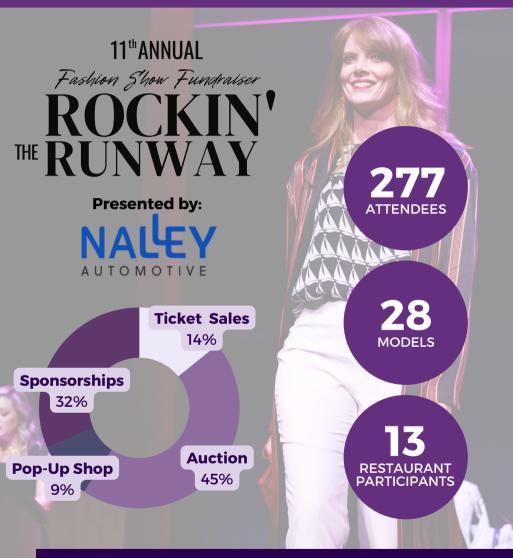
